





Since I am often asked, here is a little background on tree species, original to Rossmoor's urban forest. Some of the first parkway trees were planted by developer Ross Cortese in 1957 and 1958 when the first homes in the tract were built. Initially there were approximately nine different trees species planted, with each street having the same variety. Uniform tree planting gave Rossmoor a sophisticated elegance that complimented the houses, which were also similar to one another in architectural style and design. Today monoculture planting is not recommended due to the risk of an entire tree population being wiped out by pests or diseases that target a particular species. Original tree species include White Mulberry, Arizona Ash, Silver Maple, California Sycamore, London Plane and Black Locust. Varieties planted on streets that were developed later include: Brazilian Pepper, Southern Magnolia, Evergreen Pear and American Sweetgum, (botanical name 'Liquidambar'). Of these original species, only a few remain with hybrids of older varieties replacing the originals. Today, different trees, more suited to our climate are recommended and work better as parkway trees.

The broad, sturdy and fruitless variety of Morus Alba, (White Mulberry) with its big leaves was planted along Foster Road, Druid Lane, Newbury Rd and other streets. Of these, 185 original trees still exist. Tall, stately Arizona Ash trees lined streets such as Blume Drive, Kensington, north Wembley Rd and Weatherby and Wallingsford Roads to the north. Only 120 of these trees remain, and unfortunately will continue to be removed as they become hazardous. Silver Maples, one of the most stunning of the big trees, were topped in their early days to stunt their size; allowing decay to enter and contribute to their early demise. There are 128 of these aging beauties left along Bostonian Dr., Kensington Rd. to the south and Loch Lomond Rd. Grand California Sycamores still adorn Martha Ann Dr., but are significantly threatened by Shot Hole Borer and disease, along with their smaller hybrid cousin, The London Plane; found on many streets, including Kempton Drive, Ballantine Dr. north and Chaucer Rd. Many residents have grown up with the same tree for many years. We should continue to enjoy these original specimens for as long as we can. In addition to other values, these trees have irreplaceable sentimental value.
