## INTRODUCING ROSSMOOR WILDLIFE WATCH!

### Neighborhood Watch, meet Wildlife Watch!

Rossmoor is not a city, but an unincorporated County area. As a special district with limited powers, the Rossmoor Community Services District does not have jurisdiction over wildlife management. To manage citizen concerns regarding the urban coyote population, the RCSD, Department of Fish and Wildlife, Orange County Animal Control, and Rossmoor Homeowners Association collaborated and agreed that a highly organized and well coordinated strategy was needed. That is how the idea for Rossmoor's Wildlife Watch was born.

Special guest Tim Whitacre, 2nd District Representative with Orange County Supervisor Steel's office, led the discussion surrounding coyote related public safety concerns at the [March 8, 2016 RCSD regular board meeting](#). The Department of Fish and Wildlife and Rossmoor Homeowners Association also reported to the board on the launch of the new Rossmoor Wildlife Watch program. Wildlife Watch is a comprehensive program developed by the Department of Fish and Wildlife, which utilizes the cooperative efforts of RHA, OCAC, OCSD, existing neighborhood watch philosophy and community volunteers to accurately report and respond to coyote sightings and encounters. Several California cities, including Irvine, Seal Beach and Huntington Beach already have successful Wildlife Watch programs in place. A coyote management plan has been drafted for Rossmoor. Now volunteers are needed to implement the plan.

The first community training session will be scheduled sometime before summer. Professional training and conservation coaching will be provided. Volunteers are a vital part the success of Wildlife Watch. Ideal candidates are anyone interested in a safer community, those who are active outdoors, either jogging, dog walking, exercising, etc., those who are active on social media and students interested in a career working with animals (*especially wildlife*) also make good candidates. ## The Social Benefits of Trees


One question I get asked often is, 'Why do I have to have a tree in my parkway'? Many residents just don't want the responsibility of caring for and watering a tree. Or they're worried about the mess the leaves and flowers or maybe even seed pods will produce. Some are afraid of root damage and others think they are being environmentally smart - we are in the midst of a drought after all! While, these are all common and understandable concerns, the benefits of trees far outweigh any problems associated with them. While social and communal benefits of trees aren't always obvious, several studies have proven that trees can indeed provide significant, long-term advantages to a community. Here are just a few:

- People who live with a lot of trees around them feel less stressed.
- Recovery times are shorter for people in hospitals that see trees outside their windows.
- Property values increase and crime is greatly reduced in communities with a large tree canopy.
- Trees block noises, dust and other pollutants from nearby freeways.
- Children who play in a forested urban area, show quicker development of social and cognitive skills, improved academic performance and concentration and a reduction in symptoms of ADD and ADHD.
- Trees protect children from ultra-violet light and can reduce exposure by 50%.
- Studies have shown that people who live in urban areas with a more natural and greener environment develop a strong sense of pride, belonging and attachment to their community.

# KEMPTON MINI-PARK DEMO GARDEN PROJECT



Owen Pierce, with Troop 658, presented an overview of his Eagle Scout Project to the Board of Directors at the [March 8, 2016 regular meeting](#). Owen plans to transform the existing sandbox at Kempton Mini-Park, into a beautiful drought tolerant succulent demonstration garden with species identification markers on each plant. He will also be installing four concrete garden benches within the center of the sandbox. The design also consists of the creation of divided walkways of decomposed granite and bender board with groundcover in between each walkway. This is part of a larger Kempton Park landscaping renovation project headed by RHA President Mark Nitikman and resident Erwin Anisman. Owen will have a fundraising booth at this year's Rossmoor Community Festival on May 1st. You are welcome to stop by and learn more about this educational and worthwhile contribution to Rossmoor. The project has been scheduled to begin from Mid-June of 2016 to the end of August 2016.

## AN AMERICAN TREASURE—THE BLUEBIRD

Bluebirds are songbirds that are only native to North America. They are perching birds and secondary cavity nesters that benefit from people putting up birdhouses. In fact, nesting boxes are an increasing factor in the spread of the species. Bluebirds are closely related to Robins, which are also members of the Thrush family Turdidae. These beautiful blue, rust and white colored birds are often seen at Rush Park and thrive in the Rossmoor community due to the variety of mature trees. Audubon recently designated the Western Bluebird as Climate Threatened. Researchers believe that the bird can adapt to new areas, but it will be important for us to preserve forest and tree health to ensure that habitat is available.


